The shadow cast by the fruit-bearing hand might symbolise an ominous warning, adding an element of darkness to the offering. On the other hand, by virtue of the harshly-lit background, this vibrant red berry stands out, perhaps hinting at the power of giving or love: a beacon in this stark backdrop.

If we take our attention to the green leaves, it's interesting to note how imperfectly they are arranged. They almost look thorny. Notice how their shape looks different in the shadow. Yearning to be eaten.
